Consider constructing experiences around July 4th that will serve to enrich this celebration from hot dog eating contests and fireworks to an understanding that these men and women help the United States to be safe and strong.

## **HOME/SCHOOL CONNECTION:**

- Ask parents to talk to their children about any service members or veterans in their family or among their friends. The children might bring to school a picture of the service member and a short answer about how the service member is/was a community helper.
- Create a bulletin board about service members who are related to the children in your school to honor them during the week of July 4th and beyond.
